## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT - **Military Veteran Volunteers**

Military veterans in Northeast Georgia obviously are faithful to answer the call of duty. They did it in wartime, and they do it in peacetime.

So when someone from the Northeast Georgia History Center telephones these men and women to ask them to take part in a veterans event, they respond immediately. For example, when the History Center celebrated veterans and active-duty military on Veterans Day and during the week of Nov. 8-16, a total of 38 veterans stepped up. They took part in Family Day, the History Forum, in school visits and field trips.

Why do they do it? Retired Army Col. Larkin Vance, a veteran of World War II, says it well: "If I can motivate one child into studying history...and knowing the American way of life, I feel it's worth my time."

Veterans from all wars help out, volunteer coordinator Julie Carson says, but "World War II veterans continue to be an amazingly active group."

Col. Vance, for instance, visited three schools and then helped with Family Day and a field trip.

"Personally, it's rewarding to me because I get feedback from the children," the colonel says. "They show interest."

He can tell by their questions and comments. One student at Chestatee Academy told his teacher after hearing the colonel speak: "I

want to be just like him."

But Col. Vance does not recommend that the children lie about their age, as he did at the age of 15, to enter the service. He does urge them, however, to develop a can-do attitude. "They might reach for the stars and settle for the moon," he says. He also encourages students to study hard and stay in good physical condition through exercise.

Other World War II veterans who volunteered during the History Center's week of celebration include Francis Turner, who visited two schools and assisted with Family Day; Dan Rado, who visited one school and helped with three field trips, along with Frank Hoell, Fran Johnson, Charles Lindsey, Willis McLemore and Jack Prince.

Korean War veterans took an active role, as well. Chuck Hendrickson organized veterans to present the November History Forum, and also organized veterans to visit an area school. Korean War veterans who volunteered, in addition to Chuck, were Dr. John Burns, Heyward Hosch, Bill Huffman, Herby Lee Lawson, Charles Lindsey, Ed Parks, and Larkin Vance.
