Some volunteers at the history center like to remain in the background, quietly but efficiently doing their assignments without any fanfare.

That perfectly describes Naomi Lawson, who has been helping in the center's museum shop for several years. She also volunteers in the gift shop at the Northeast Georgia Medical Center.

Naomi also has pitched in at the history center's estate sales and at a garden sale at Chicopee Woods Agricultural Center, where she handed out brochures about the center's activities. Actually, though, Naomi will not say a lot about what she does. But Julie Carson will.

"She is absolutely dependable and always here for her Museum Shop shift," said Julie, who's in charge of education and volunteer activities. Comprised of 18 interpretive text panels, interactive artifact stations, ship and airplane models, and a military diorama, this exhibit explores the daily lives of Georgians on the home front and battle front during the Second World War.
